Action for Bow ANNUAL REPORT 2016-2017

Action for Bow supports education, training and employment opportunities; sports and recreation; environmental and regeneration issues in Bow East and West Wards. This registered charity (1104269) was established by the Tower Hamlets Housing Action Trust, whose residual responsibilities were taken over by the Greater London Authority in 2013. Half Moon Young Peoples' Theatre



Actor-Facilitators' Workshop

The Half Moon Young People's Theatre delivered workshops and theatre performances for primary school Year 6 classes to explore potential fears about starting secondary school. They presented difficult scenarios that could occur in the first few weeks and the young people were able to step into the action and change the outcomes through selecting different behaviour for the characters.

Walk East: Guided Walks for the Over 50s

During the summer seventeen residents aged 50+ had a choice of ten guided walks of 1.5 to 2.2 miles to six areas of Tower Hamlets to learn more about the local East End, make connections with community projects, enhance physical health, mental wellbeing and meet other residents.

An average of ten walkers attended each walk that included heritage talks, behind-the-scenes visits to local landmarks, meetings with community workers and a coffee stop in a community facility. The Geezers Club provides weekly activities for older people plus participation in neighbourhood forums and festivals. A wide range of visits were made to sporting and cultural venues. Innovations during the year included gym classes, and 'learn my way' IT training at the Bromley by Bow Centre.

A major achievement was to receive the 2016 Arts and Green Energy award by RegenSW for a joint project between Geezers Club members, artist Loraine Leeson and engineer Toby Borland, for the development and promotion of sustainable technologies including a roof-top turbine-driven light work; a new tidal river turbine and an oxygenating stream wheel to support fish survival in the River Lea.



Their 'OurBow.com' website, with information on their activities and local news, has now exceeded 85,000 visits.

As shown below, a total of £41,277 was granted to eleven organisations, which was matched by £16,418 donated by four other organisations, plus contributions in kind. Ten projects were delivered for younger people - mainly for out of school activities and also two for primary school children to prepare them for their transfer to secondary school which is a significant local issue. There were five projects for older people - particularly for physical and mental fitness.

A grant of £6,084 was also made to the Bromley by Bow Centre to assist with a challenging new project to match young people with local apprenticeships, that was particularly successful with placements in the healthcare sector.
